"What do you want?" (Mark 10:35-45)

This passage describes two contrasting events:

In the first event, Jesus **<u>rejected</u>** a request. In the second event, Jesus **<u>granted</u>** a request.

First Event:

- \rightarrow James and John, the sons of Zebedee, asked Jesus to hear their request.
- → Jesus asked, "*What do you want me to do for you?*"
- \rightarrow They selfishly asked for the seats next to Jesus so that they will receive glory.
- \rightarrow The request was rejected

Second Event:

- \rightarrow A blind man ("two blind men" according to Matthew) asked Jesus for mercy.
- → Jesus asked, "*What do you want me to do for you?*"
- \rightarrow The blind man asked Jesus to open his eyes so he could see.
- \rightarrow The request was granted

Lesson: Jesus wants us to be aware what we want.

- In these events, Jesus asked "What do you want?" (10:36, 51)
- <u>Not</u> because He needed information, but because He wanted <u>them to be clear</u> what they were asking for.
- He does not promise to answer selfish prayers, but does provide what we need.
- If you ask Jesus to help you believe in Him, then He will help you believe!

Two more lessons from the second event:

- 1. Jesus wants us to come to Him. (Mark 10:49)
 - If we want to go to Jesus, *<u>nothing</u>* can stop us.
- 2. <u>Jesus cares for us</u>. (Matthew 20:34 (parallel passage))
 - Jesus cares for us with *compassion*!
